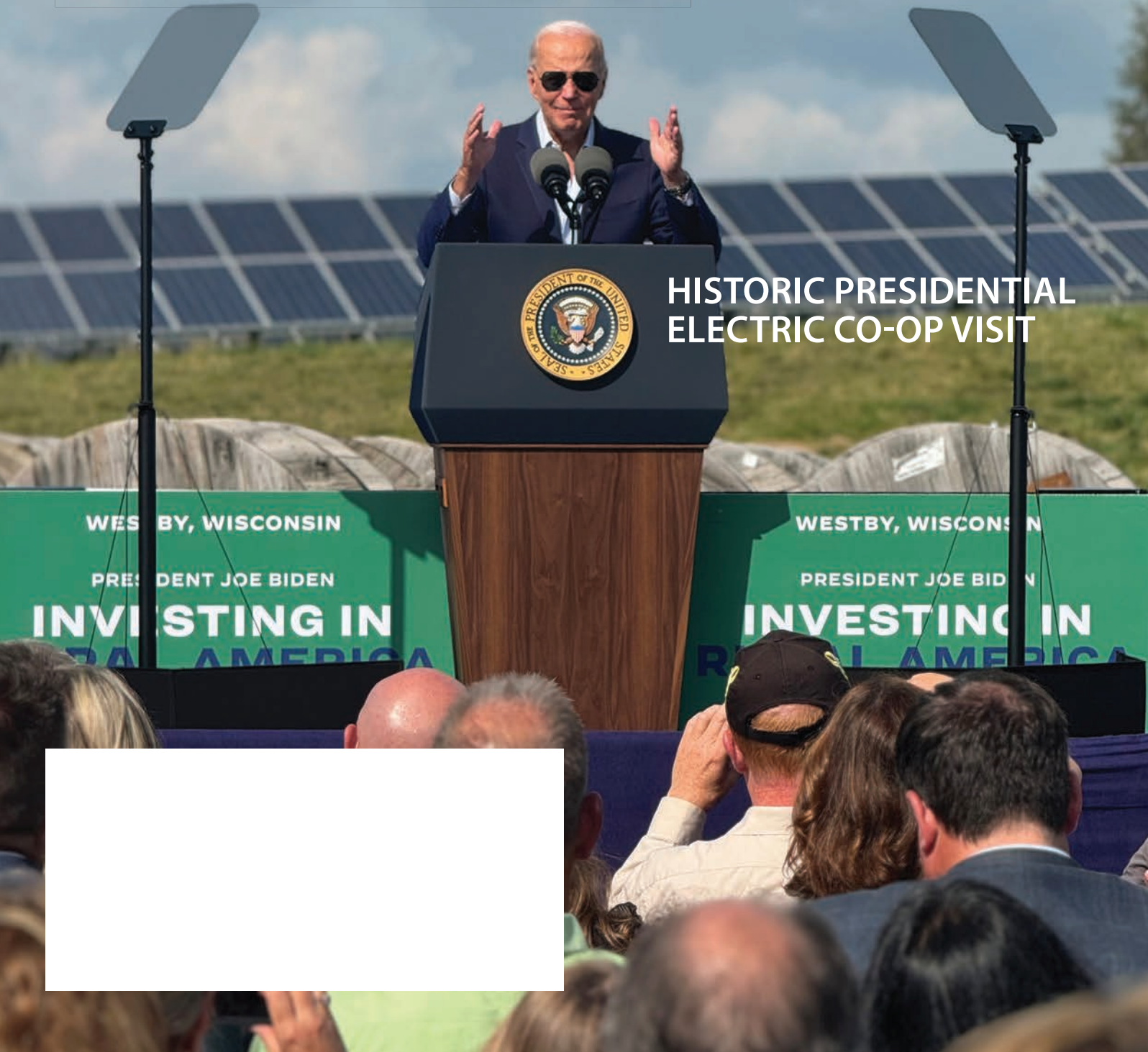

4. Autonomy and Independence

Co-ops are independent and can operate on their own, which ultimately benefits the members.

5. Education, Training and Information

Co-ops continuously focus on education to ensure employees, directors and members have the training and information they need to make the co-op successful.

6. Cooperation Among Cooperatives

Co-ops share with and learn from other cooperatives. We help each other out in times of need because we want other co-ops to thrive.

7. Concern for Community

MEMBERS THANKFUL FOR ELECTRONICS RECYCLING EVENT

On September 6 we hosted our third Electronics Recycling Event. Members were given the opportunity to get rid of old and broken electronic equipment such as computers, printers, telephones, vacuums, and televisions. Members were allowed to bring a total of ten items, and three of them could be TVs or computer monitors.

This event continues to be a great success. As members drove up, we registered them to verify that they were indeed OEC members. They then pulled ahead to the unloading area where OEC employees unloaded their goods.

We registered 238 members and over 1,500 electronic items. What does that many electronics look like? Well, we had 20 pallets of televisions/computer monitors, seven dumpsters of electronics, and two gaylord boxes full of cords. The event allows electronics to be properly recycled, keeping hazardous materials out of our landfills.

Members commented on how smooth and efficient the process was, and we received endless “thank yous” too. (1079300)

From apprentice to journeyman

Tanner Riley recently obtained his journeyman line worker certification by completing the state of Wisconsin's rigorous four-year Electric Line Worker Apprenticeship program at NWTC in Green Bay. To receive this certification, an apprentice is required to complete 7,360 hours of on-the-job training, along with 640 hours of classroom-based instruction, for a total of 8,000 hours. Tanner passed his final comprehensive exam this past spring.

We are very proud of Tanner's accomplishment. He has been employed with Oconto Electric Cooperative since May of 2021. We are also happy to hear that Tanner and his fiancée, Kirsten, are planning their wedding for August 2025. Tanner tells us he is looking forward to a long journeyman career at Oconto Electric Cooperative. Congratulations, Tanner!

Energy Efficiency Tip of the Month

If you recently made or plan to make energy efficiency improvements to your home, you may be eligible for federal tax credits. The Inflation Reduction Act (IRA) of 2022 empowers homeowners to save money on energy efficiency improvements and upgrades. Homeowners can save up to \$3,000 annually to lower the cost of efficiency upgrades by up to 30%.

A few upgrades covered through the IRA include new exterior doors, windows, insulation, heating/cooling equipment and other major appliances. If you completed an upgrade this year or you are considering one, visit www.energystar.gov/federal-tax-credits to learn if you qualify for a tax credit.
